The much anticipated battle between the top two undefeated teams loomed at last. We ventured to Memorial Oval

Greensborough with the Neal Butterworth Memorial Trophy and the psychological high ground leading into the finals at stake.

After winning the toss we decided to have a bat. Things got off to their usual hectic start with Chooka (R. Felthouse) and Peter Costello (J. Wilson) at the helm. Peter was the first to depart with the score on 36 after receiving one of the worst LBW decisions ever seen. He fair dinkum whacked it into his own pad with a half hearted shout from only the bowler getting the nod from the man in white. uncharacteristically vented his frustration on a toilet door that now has some permanent ventilation. From there we batted fairly well with the other top six batsmen all getting starts of sorts. Chooka racked up a brisk 38 before holing out. He is very close to breaking through for big score, let's hope it's this week. Colonel (A. Young) contributed a classy 29 whilst Chicken Man (A. Stuart) made 16 and Ocka (B. O'Connor) a decent effort of 27. Ando (G. Anderson) chipped in with 13 and Marty Veal another consistent effort of 30. At this point we were 7/175 and still hopeful of posting 200+. Unfortunately the tail failed to wag this game and we were quickly wrapped up from there for 180. At least we had 7 overs at their batsmen and we decided to throw everything at them bar the kitchen sink. With fielders ringing the batsmen offering all sorts of helpful advice, Ocka picked up the first wicket with an LBW shout from all 11 players that would have been easily heard in Sydney. He then picked up his second wicket of the evening clean bowling the other opener. In scenes reminiscent of a grand final against Heidelberg a couple of years back we then had to catch Ocka as he celebrated with his now famous airplane antics covering large sections of the oval. We went in that evening well satisfied that we had dented Greensborough's confidence as they stood at 2/15.

41 degree temperatures greeted us as we arrived the next week to defend our challenging total. As sweat poured off us during the very short warmup we knew this was going to be an ugly ugly day. There was no panic in the rooms however as we all sensed this was an opportunity for a supreme sacrifice with the chance of a memory making team victory as the reward.

Philo (P. Barnes) picked up the 3<sup>rd</sup> wicket quickly clean bowling their no. 3 batsman. It was lucky he kept his focus and wasn't distracted by the batsman who seemed to have an unusual stance being as it was somewhere out near the square leg umpire. Ocka kept the pressure on at the other end before being replaced by Fez (C. Carroll) as short spells were the order of the day. We had talked before the game that catches would be the key today and the next 3 wickets paid testament to that. Firstly Peter Costello seized a beauty in his left hand at short mid wicket from a shot right out of the middle off very tight bowling by Fez. Then Fez collected his next victim getting one to pop up off the shoulder of the bat to be superbly caught by Chooka running and diving full length forward from his gully position. Then D-Lo (D. Barnes) enticed an edge from a left hander to be brilliantly snared by Fez low and to his left in one hand at first slip. With the score now at 6/61 there were celebrations and send offs a plenty as we joyously gathered for each wicket. The bowling changes continued a plenty but for a short period were blunted as the 7<sup>th</sup> wicket proved harder to come by. Finally Philo conjured some magic getting one to nip back and grab our next wicket as the batsman shouldered arms only to have his off stump uprooted. The next wicket fell to Chicken Man who by this time had sent down over 10 straight overs with his left arm orthodox spin, getting a caught behind which was well taken by Colonel doing a wonderful effort of concentrating behind the stumps. Fez was then introduced downwind and firstly removed Greensborough's mainstay of the innings falling to another scintillating catch by Ando running in and diving forward from a deepish cover position. Then Fez thankfully collected our final wicket with a straight one trapping the no. 11 dead in front. Our joy at winning was like discovering a hidden oasis in the desert. We could finally celebrate and get off the bloody field. A wonderful effort in extreme conditions by all the bowlers likewise matched by one of our best ever efforts in the field. A great team performance by all 11 players that we will not forget for a long time but which also now gives us enormous confidence heading towards the finals.

Bloody beauty were Darren Butterworth's words as we joyously conveyed to him by phone to Perth that we had won his Dad's trophy.

We all know the following Saturday was a HOT one and in this heat the batsmen were going to find it hard going. We got off to a great start with the little RED BULL and Yarni (John Karis) opening, whereby they put on 20 in no time when the little RED BULL played and missed, another quick wicket fell after to bring Yarni and Marty (Phillips) to together to consolidate the innings whereby they took it to 80odd runs

before Marty was caught. PD and Lukey Taylor fell cheaply and at tea time we were 4/89 runs with Yarni and Vealy at the crease, a quick 60 odd run partnership b/w these two put us right back into the hunt with the heat taking its toll on the fielding side but also YARNI who batted for almost 60 overs for his 60 runs. This was one of the best knocks ever in the heat. All of us on the boundary cannot believe the stamina, concentration and gutsy effort from him - TRULY AMAZING. Runs from Doc, Billy (Sier) and Vealy were not enough to get us over the line as we ran out of overs.

Finally Brad won a toss and sent the opposition in on what turned out to be a pleasant day for cricket. We soon had them 1/1 after 6 very tight overs from both Greg Barnes & Rayan Moore and some good fielding. Their 2nd wicket put on 32 with us putting down 3 catches, 2 which should probably been taken, having them 1/33 after 16 overs with 7 maidens bowled between both openers. Rayan finished up with 8 overs 3 maidens 1/9. Dave Veal replaced Rayan with more tight bowling ending up with 5 overs 2 maidens 1/9 and after 23 overs we had them 2/40, with Greg bowling 11 overs 4 maidens 0/29. Ian Crawford and Marcus Kernaghan continued the tight bowling, being well backed up in the field by all players, with Dave Wilson taking a specky and Rennah chipping in with a stumping we ended up having them all out for 87 off 39.5 overs just on Tea. Crawf ended up with figures of 8.5 overs 2 maidens 6/20 with his lolly pops and Marcus 7 overs 2/20. We had 40 overs to bat for the day with Brad and Dave opening unfortunately we lost Dave early bowled for 1. Marcus joined Brad taking the score to 86 when Marcus was given out unluckily LBW after 25 overs we were 2/86 and with only 2 runs required for a 1st innings win unfortunately we lost Brad on the same score with a well made 43 including 6 fours, his last 5 scoring shots being 4's. At one stage the Umpire had had enough and was wanting to call it quits and came off the ground saying he wasn't feeling crash hot, leaving us to finish the game with 2 Bellfield guys umpiring.

This win takes us to top spot with Greensborough (3rd) to play last game. We need to continue the performance of this match for the rest of the season, and not let our efforts and performances of the last couple of matches go to our heads.
